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Blockchain and Cryptocurrencies

On Monday Alexar Pendashteh spoke to us about blockchain and cryptocurrencies. He explained that databases of information have traditionally been controlled by an entity, such as a bank, whereas the network of the world wide web have been free to all users. Blockchain enables the merging of a database with the network so that it is not controlled by a single entity, such as a Reserve Bank. The blockchain database cannot be altered without universal agreement.

Bitcoin was just the first implementation of blockchain, and in many ways can be considered as a prototype of the technology. The concept was started in 2008 by an unknown person (or persons) as a digital system of value exchange. A system of value exchange must have three elements: firstly it must be a scarce commodity (like gold), secondly it must be divisible (like gold but unlike a diamond) and thirdly it must be exchangeable between people (like gold pieces). Bitcoin meets all three elements of a system of value exchange but in a digital manner and without central control. In due course, Google announced that it would accept Bitcoin payment and then more people took notice and its use started to surge. In particular, Chinese people noticed it and were able to use Bitcoins to transfer money out of China, initially without the awareness of their government. The more Bitcoin was used the greater the perceived value.

Bitcoin is a matter of trust between people without involvement of a central bank. Governments can't really stop it, although they may try to restrict its use. With

Bitcoin the speed of transaction is slow and maybe this means that it cannot be sustained; but what is exciting about Bitcoin is the prototype of the blockchain distributed database technology.

Alexar commented that another way to look at Bitcoin, and other cryptocurrencies, is as a trader. He said that he is excited by the technology but wouldn't use it as a money making investment.
